Abstract

This synthetic working paper demonstrates the mechanics of a maintainable publication workflow for a restrained research-and-development website. The example shows how structured metadata, version-specific files, a stable public landing page, and an explicit archive can work together. It contains no research result and should not be cited as evidence about HealthRadar.

1. Purpose and scope

The publication system separates authored content from the shared site templates. Editors create or revise a structured entry and add version-specific assets. The build process validates the content, generates indexable landing pages, updates the research index and sitemap, and preserves earlier public versions at stable archive paths.

2. Illustrative content lifecycle

Stage	What the editor does	Public effect
Draft	Adds metadata and files in a content-only folder.	Excluded from the public build.
Preview	Runs the local preview command.	Visible only in the private local preview.
Publish	Sets visibility to public and commits the content.	Landing page, index card, PDF, and sitemap entry are generated.
Supersede	Adds a new version file and marks the earlier version superseded.	The prior version remains in the version archive.
Withdraw	Marks the version withdrawn without deleting it.	The landing page retains a visible withdrawn notice.

3. Version integrity

A publicly identified PDF is not replaced in place. Each version has its own metadata file, document filename, and archive URL. A later version may become the current landing-page version, but earlier files remain available with their original labels. Git history and immutable site releases provide additional recovery points.

4. Safety and privacy boundaries

The publishing workflow has no public authoring route and no visitor upload route. Public comments remain disabled. The content model is for research papers, updates, commentary, and externally hosted video metadata; it is not a patient portal and must not be used to collect laboratory reports or personal health information.

5. Limitations of this demonstration

This document demonstrates publication structure only. It does not test clinical performance, user comprehension, model behavior, diagnostic accuracy, safety, effectiveness, or health outcomes. No planned HealthRadar study is represented as completed validation.
